

MANIOTOTO WELCOMES AND WOWS

Central Otago's Tourism Advisory Board had an opportunity to explore another part of Central Otago when they met in Wedderburn this month.

At its first meeting in January 2019 the Board identified that it was important it reached out to all parts of the region to understand how best to add value. Following its final meeting planned for November this year, the Board will have visited all corners of Central Otago and connected with many of the tourism operators providing visitor experiences in the region.

As well as attending the Tourism Central Otago (TCO) operator forum in Naseby, the Board visited and participated in a variety of experiences in the Maniototo area – including a four-wheel drive tour to Danseys Pass and the Shortland's Sheds and curling.

Board Chair Sue Sullivan said the development of new visitor experiences in the area impressed Board members.

"The experiences are connected to the area's environment and its unique stories, and combined with knowledgeable and passionate people at the helm."

"Product development is a priority action within the Central Otago Tourism Strategy and the Board is excited to see how the Central Otago community is embracing the opportunities that tourism provides by developing new visitor experiences and broadening the range of what the region has to offer," she said.

TCO progress on key projects was a highlight of this meeting.

"With the recent signing of a Memorandum of Understanding by Central Otago District Council, Dunedin City Council and Queenstown Lakes District Council, and regional tourism organisations supporting the Central Otago touring route, it is exciting to see this high priority project ready to move towards obtaining the necessary approvals from NZTA," said Mrs Sullivan.

Tourism Central Otago's General Manager Dylan Rushbrook noted for the Board that the month-long 2019 Eat Taste Central event beginning Friday 20th September is already benefitting from additional partner support.

"We are achieving wider reaching pre-event promotion through Kia Ora and at Dunedin Airport to name just a couple. In addition, this week our TCO team is hosting a regional familiarisation for a group of Inbound Tourism Operators whose client portfolios align with the tourism

strategy's goal of targeting for value. This is yet another example of progress on key projects," Mr Rushbrook said.

A challenge for all New Zealand's regional tourism organisations is that of accessing useful data. Board members confirmed they will be actively connecting with the industry in the lead

up to the national data hui on 17th October that will bring together central government, local government, industry and service providers to look at information and data needs, and consider products that may be available. The next Tourism Advisory Board meeting is scheduled for 7th – 8th November in Alexandra.

BOOMERANG BAGS

Year 4, 5 and 6 at Maniototo Area school are studying sustainability and so we decided to make boomerang bags for the local Maniototo Four Square. If you forget your bags you can get them at the checkout.

We are doing it because it will be better for the environment, as we no longer use plastic bags. We hope you enjoy the boomerang bags and bring them back.

How we made our boomerang bags

First, we decided how big our bag was going to be then we drew and cut out our pattern on brown paper. We made multiple patterns until we were happy. We cut it on fabric and sewed three times until we were happy.

We ironed the fabric and when Rachel Andrews came she helped us learn how to use a sewing machine so when we made our own bags we could do it ourselves.

After that, we did our design for the boomerang bag. We had to go through 4 steps until we drew our design on fabric.

Once we had done that then we had a go at making our bags. First, we cut a pattern then Mrs Crutchley overlocked the raw seams and then we stitched up seams and tucked the handle under the top before reinforcing them along the bottom to make it strong.

Once we finished making our bags we then ironed and sewed the designs on them on. Now our bags were ready to go.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

While Naseby residents Marilyn and Eric Swinbourn were travelling by train last month in the UK they detected a Kiwi accent from the next seats. "As one does, we started chatting and comparing notes. The usual "where are you from" and believe it or not, two of our fellow travellers were from Oturehua. Thomas and Sam McKnight." So, upon suggestion by Marilyn, Positively Maniototo caught up with Sam to see what they're up to since leaving the Maniototo.

Tom (29) and Sam (27) are the sons of Peter and Bronwyn McKnight and were born in Dunedin and their sister Amelia (22) was born in Ranfurly.

Thanks for catching up with Positively Maniototo Sam. Tell us a little about your Maniototo connection ...

Mum and Dad are Peter and Bronwen McKnight, currently living in Geraldine running a cafe in Orari. Before that they ran the family farm with Dad's parents, Neil and Faye McKnight, at Kliften outside of Oturehua.

Tom and I started out at Oturehua Primary School, I was one of the last to be enrolled at

there. Once the school closed we went in to Maniototo Area School until 2000. Dad served on the board of trustees during this time. Following our departure we went to Ashburton and attended Allenton Primary and Intermediate. We attended high school at Geraldine. Tom did a Masters' in Planning at Otago University, I studied Agricultural in Lincoln and Amelia studied Teaching at Otago University.

When did you head overseas?

Tom left NZ June 2017 and travelled through South America for 4 months before living in Amsterdam for a year, then onto Edinburgh where he now lives.

I left in May 2019 travelled through Africa, camping for 70 days, visiting 11 countries from Kenya through to Namibia. I moved to London in late July.

Where are you and what are you doing now?

Tom works as a urban planner in Edinburgh and I work in account management in London.

What gave you the motivation to head away on such an adventure?

Sam: Having worked in NZ for four and a half years, it became time for a new adventure. I feel in life you often need to do away with the daily grind and step out into

something new. I want to see Europe, but also experience a different way of life than what I was used to in NZ. Traveling young gives you the ability to do some more adventure based activities - which is what we enjoyed through Africa.

When I made my decision to leave I had to sell up my house in Wanganui, along with basically all my belongings in order to pack what I needed into a 55 litre backpack - the act of which makes you realise how little you actually need to enjoy life. After hearing about everyone else's adventures I decided it was time to make my own memories and highlights - as in the end memories are not given, but created.

London gives me a good base to travel Europe, flights are cheap and the train is easy to take across the English Channel after work. We look forward to taking the usual kiwi approach and packing out as many weekend trips as we can in Europe over the coming years!



Tom in Amsterdam with his partner Crystal who is originally from Opotiki and currently works as a lawyer in Edinburgh.

Tom: Much the same as brother, after working the corporate life in Auckland and Wellington my partner and I decided to embark on our overseas adventure. Looking to get a little out of our comfort zone we first decided on a trip to South America, which included incredible countries like Colombia and Bolivia. We quickly

found kiwi norms, such as dairy products and health and safety, quickly went out the window as we survived on plantain and boiled chicken and undertook adventures such as exploring the infamous Cerro Rico mountain mine in Potosi and hitching rides on school buses to reach our destinations in Ecuador.

Following South America we chose to go a different direction and forgo London for Amsterdam for a year. We quickly fell in love with the city and the relaxed way of life - and quickly came to understand how the liberal Dutch approach has allowed the country to flourish into a business and logistical powerhouse. Being an urbanist I loved the joy of being able to bike anywhere and the utter freedom and joy it gives you to be able to glide to work every day, breath in fresh air, have complete silence at night and generally be a more relaxed, happy and healthy human being!

Following Amsterdam we decided on Edinburgh. I had always wanted to see where my Scottish ancestry came

from, with of course Scottish culture being a big part of my life growing up in the Maniototo and attending university in Dunedin. Highlights so far include: accumulating a great Scotch collection (with Islay malts being a particular favourite), attending spectacular ceilidhs up in Abeerdenshire, visiting the Isle of Arran, hearing 'Flower of Scotland' being belted out by 85,000 proud Scots at Murrayfield and enjoying the great camaraderie that exists between the Scots and Kiwis over here

Any particular inspirations?

Tom and I both want to see where our ancestors are from, which includes Orkney Island and Ayrshire Coast in Scotland, with both of us lucky enough to visit where our English ancestors came from in Stoke by Nayland in Suffolk, England.

Visiting Anzac cove in Turkey
Attending WW1 battlefields in Belgium/France
Attending Burns night supper in Scotland
Doing a van trip through Europe
Attending ABs v Scotland at Murrayfield
Attending a test match at Lords

Where to next?

Sam will spend 2 years in London. Then onto Canada for a year then travel through South America home.

Tom is also looking at moving to Canada after Edinburgh.





As our pets age dental disease can start to set in. We often start noticing signs from around the age of five (which equates to around 35 in human years).

Dental disease can affect the internal organs and the overall health of your pet.

There are some measures you can take to help slow or prolong the effects of dental disease at home.

Dental disease occurs due to the build-up of dental plaque. Plaque, which then hardens to become tartar, can build up as a result of poor mouth structure/conformation, individual or breed susceptibility, dietary preference for soft foods, or presence of broken teeth.


How to help prevent dental disease:

CLACHANBURN COMMENT

Bulbs, blossoms, birds and snow! a combination which is not unusual for gardeners in the Maniototo in Spring. We take what we get, and to be fair we have had a mild winter on the whole. On balance no heavy snow, no broken branches, no hard damaging frosts, so lets hope the season ahead will be good for both gardeners and farmers alike. With snow well down our surrounding mountains, frosts could be on the cards and give roses a bit of a knock, but at least no one will have potatoes up and most fruit will not have set yet, but if you have new young plants perhaps watch them and cover if necessary.

If you are revising an existing garden bed or border, which we are here, begin by taking stock of the plants, what are healthy and what needs to go, assess the location sunny or shady, is it sheltered and what soil type, is water available, all of these factors will determine what plants are most suitable. Here the border is near the house, so no planting will block our view from inside. Our roses are still good but have had perennials which are now too big and too close to the roses, which is not good for them. Roses like to have space and free moving air between them, not over crowded which will affect their performance and encourage disease. Now we will select bulbs and perennials to give colour from Spring to well into Autumn. Consider your colour choices, a variety of different heights and avoid aggressive plants which will become a problem all too soon. Before replanting apply a good layer of compost. Have fun and enjoy watching your garden develop to your satisfaction.

What is a nurse plant I am asked? In our climate the most common are tussocks, which can be planted to "nurse" new trees or shrubs, often in a new open area where a new house has been built. Once established the nurse plant, in this instance the tussocks can be removed making room for more desirable plants.

The local Garden Club has revised their Maniototo Gardeners' Book. Emphasis has been placed on encouraging gardeners to use organic and environmentally friendly products, the extensive plant lists have been modified to no longer include plants which are now deemed to be prohibited and it contains many handy hints.

It is a great little book for all gardeners including new comers to our district. It retails for \$15 and is available from More than Books, The Maniototo Paint and Hardware and from Mary Wright the secretary of our club. A great Xmas gift.

KNIFE CLEANER

Before 1919, when stainless steel cutlery began production, all households had silver cutlery. By itself this would not have been a problem but mix it with a smoky coal burning cooking range and staining occurs and no proud housekeeper wants

that. One method to remove this stain from knives was by abrasive means, putting it between two surfaces of revolving fine sandstone. Very easy, never mind the fine scratches on the, now, shiny surface.

The knife cleaner on display in the museum is a small one therefore probably belonged to a household.
