A JOB WELL DONE

What could have been a far more catastrophic event last month was thwarted by the awesome efforts of local and out of town fire fighters (Fire and Emergency NZ – Otago and Southland), Police, Civil Defence and Tinder dry conditions and multiple Heli Otago. lightning strikes created the imperfect storm on hillside property above Taieri Lake Reserve on the back road from Waipiata to Kokonga.



An initial sighting of the blaze was called in by an agricultural worker from the United Kingdom at around 6pm on Wednesday the 6th of March. In fact, multiple fires had broken out in the Strath Taieri and Maniototo area due to lightning strikes with all but one quickly contained. The focus remained on Kokonga. State Highway 87 was closed to allow a base to be created, emergency service and volunteers to move around safely and for water tankers to re-fill from the river. Also, a segment of the Otago Central Rail Trail was closed.

There is no way to effectively report on the act of terror in Christchurch and how it has shaken every single one of us.

However, as many communities did, the Maniototo felt the need to acknowledge and mourn for not only the lost and wounded but for the way it has changed the country. On Friday 22nd March, Maniototo Area School (MAS) hosted a memorial service on their senior school lawn. St John school students joined them, their teachers and members of the public for a very moving service. Maniototo Area School Principal Mr Ferdinands, our Mayor Tim Cadogan, head students and student council members spoke discerningly about the tragedy.

Fifty students let fifty brightly coloured helium balloons go as names of the victims were read aloud This showed the true enormity of the situation faced by the emergency services who responded to the callouts. The National Anthem was sung and the school students, led by the MAS Kapa Haka group Utaina, He Honare and the last balloon is released.



This year the formal also included a sit down buffet meal which was thoroughly enjoyed as it gave students the chance to talk and enjoy the efforts everyone went to to look so smart!






Eight to ten helicopters were on site at any one time with monsoon buckets battling the blaze. By dark the fire had spread over 50 hectares and threatened two properties with occupants of both evacuated to Kokonga Lodge. Helicopters had to stop working once visibility was an issue and crews remained on site overnight to provide protection to the houses. At first light on Thursday the 7th of March the helicopters and full crew were back on site by which time the fire covered approximately 280 hectares. Rural Fire Fighters were distributed around the site to discover and put out hot spots throughout the day. A call went out via Facebook and Burn 729am/87.9fm (see page 13) for donations of food to be delivered to the radio station for distribution to the workers and volunteers.

By 5pm the fire was controlled and contained, with all displaced residents able to return to their homes by 6pm. State Highway 87 was re-opened and the Rail Trail section opened the following day.

"Fire and Emergency would like to thank the efforts of our team and partners, including the Police, Civil Defence, and especially our tireless firefighters for their commitment and support in fighting the fires in Kokonga. We would also like to acknowledge the public for their support and understanding and the donations of food and supplies to our front line teams."



Fences were destroyed and established kowhai trees burnt to the ground but the black scar on the hillside which can be seen across the valley is rapidly disappearing as fresh, green growth comes through. All was not lost as it so easily could have

been and, yet again, the people of the Maniototo came together to show their support.

- how to create and practice a household emergency plan.
- Don't rely on an official warning to leave. Wildfires can start quickly and threaten lives and homes within minutes.
- Check the radio, internet and social media for updates and evacuation advice from Fire and Emergency.
- If you plan to leave early, then you must leave your home well before a Wildfire threatens and travelling by road becomes hazardous.

- assemble and maintain emergency survival items
- about having a getaway kit in case you have to leave in a hurry.
- Implement your household emergency plan, and take your getaway kit with you.
- If you've evacuated, don't return home until you're advised that it's safe.
- Call family and friends or use social media to let them know you're safe.

MAKE YOUR HOME AND FAMILY FIRE SAFE

Maintenance tips to reduce the risk of fire to your home.

Spouting/gutters. Clear regularly and consider screening with metal mesh. Embers can easily ignite dry material that collects in gutters.

Fences. Fences can create a direct path from the fire to your house. Use fire resistant fencing material or separate your house from a wooden fence with a metal gate to slow the advance of a fire. Cut the grass along the fence line to reduce fuel for a fire.

Under the house and decks. Enclose the base of the house, decks and balconies with fire-resistant material or fire mesh to reduce the risk of embers getting beneath your house and igniting it.

Sheds and Outbuildings. Give any structure within 10 metres of your house the same fire safe considerations as you do your home.

Firewood. Store firewood and other combustibles as far as possible from any house or store in a closed shed.

Landscaping. Ten metres from your house is your most important line of defence, where you should:

- mow lawn and plant low-growing fire resistant plants.
- thin and prune trees and shrubs.
- avoid tall trees close to the house.
- use gravel or decorative crushed rock instead of bark or wood chip mulch.
- remove flammable debris like twigs, pine needles and dead leaves from the roof and around and under the house and decks remove dead plant material along fence lines and keep the grass short.
- remove overhanging branches near power lines.



What would you do with an extra \$5000 dollars?

Bovine Viral Diarrhoea (BVD) is a wide spread, infectious cattle disease that causes reproductive losses, an increase in general disease and reduced growth rates. Losses are estimated to be \$3000-\$9000 per 100 breeding cows in an infected herd per year.

The disease is maintained in a herd and spread to other herds by persistently infected (PI) animals. PI animals excrete large amounts of the virus throughout their lives. A PI animal is always born that way and never created after birth. A PI animal is created when either a naïve cow gets transiently infected with BVD during early pregnancy (<4 months gestation) or when a PI cow gives birth to a calf. PI animals are often sickly or small animals and die at a relatively young age, but others appear normal, never show any illness and breed successfully (creating more PI animals).

Transient infections (TI) in pregnant cattle after the 4th month of gestation will only result in the foetus being transiently infected. Once an animal recovers from a transient infection, it will be immune to further infection for several years. TI animals may be a minor source of infection for other cattle.

To control BVD, you must prevent the formation of PI

calves by making sure that early pregnant cows do not become infected with the virus. Control is a 4-step process.

- Assess the level of risk for BVD on your farm cattle movement on/off property, contact with neighbours cattle.
- **2.** Define BVD status of herd collect 15 blood samples to measure herd antibody levels.
- **3.** Action the most appropriate control plan for your farm based on results from above 2 steps. This may include vaccination.
- 4. Monitor annually to ensure the plan is working

If you think you've heard this all before and understand BVD, that's great! But what you may not have heard is that one brand of BVD vaccine is now proven to provide foetal protection for up to 12 months if administration guidelines are followed. This is a game-changer for BVD in beef herds where previously the biggest resistance to vaccination was getting the vaccine timing right to ensure no PI formation. This is no longer an issue!

Finally, don't forget about the bulls! It should be farm policy that any breeding bulls used are tested negative for BVD and are fully vaccinated before use and get their ANNUAL booster.





BENEFITS OF A BUDDY

'A seed that fell from a tree in Autumn, can one day grow to be a tree itself in Spring.'

The **'Buddy Programme'** run by Family Works, was created to provide emotional and social support to children. It matches children (Young Buddies) with carefully selected and trained adult volunteers (Adult Buddies).

Once a week they hang out, usually for a couple of hours, and provide friendship, support, guidance and encouragement to increase the child's self-esteem.

Since the Buddy Programme began in 1992, hundreds of young people have been part of the programme. For most, the impact of the programme has been life changing. Sometimes is difficult to gauge just how much being part of the program has helped these young people.

Helen Bond, Buddy Coordinator in Central Otago, recently caught up with Taryn Gray, who was a Young Buddy over 10 years ago. Taryn (pictured) had nothing but positive statements to make about the Buddy Programme.



Taryn joined the Buddy Program when

she was 11/12 years old, when she was going through a rough patch. She was faced with challenges and changes within her home environment that led to a serious knock to her self confidence.

Taryn's Adult Buddy would pick Taryn up from school and they would spend time together once a week. Taryn's Adult Buddy lived on a farm so they did plenty of farm activities. Taryn remembers the horses in particular.

Taryn remembers learning from her Buddy early on that that *"It's ok to not be ok."*

In their time together, trust was built and Taryn opened up to her Buddy and she helped Taryn work through those traumatic times. Taryn's confidence grew and she came to terms with the issues she had faced.

Taryn said she doesn't know how she would have coped if it hadn't been for her Adult Buddy. Taryn said it was "...really helpful to have someone trusted I could talk to....looking back - I don't know if I'd have been able to deal with it if I hadn't had her". The pair remained connected as Buddies for almost two years, until Taryn started High School and then it became difficult logistically.

Taryn is now 24 years old and says she often thinks about her Buddy and wonders what she is up to. Taryn has recently thought about becoming an Adult Buddy herself and looks forward to becoming involved when the time is right.

"It was the highlight of my week - I LOVED it".

THE SOUTHERN TRUST

Southern Victorian Charitable Trust Inc has made the transition to The Southern Trust. Previously, SVCT operated the machines at the Ranfurly Hotel, and since they have wound up, the Southern Trust has taken over. SVCT operated in the Maniototo for approximately 13 years and, over that time, has given nearly \$1m to local organisations including Radio Charity (t/a Burn 729am/87.9fm), Maniototo Rural Art Deco Inc (Ranfurly Art Deco Festival), Ranfurly Playcentre and the Evergreens.

A function was held in Ranfurly last month at the Ranfurly Hotel where The Chair of Southern Trust Evan Moore and Steve Bennett (the National Grants Manager) attending alongside Jocelyn and Mearl from SVCT Inc. Mearl and Jocelyn have a long and respected relationship with many in the Maniototo Community. Steve says, *"Approximately 15 people came along to meet us. Evan and myself spoke to the locals about the changes".*

The main message was about the money that is raised in the Maniototo, stays in the Maniototo. Whilst we do not have a large amount to distribute at present, as we are building up funds from the take-over date, we will be keen to talk to any Maniototo groups about how we can support them. The Southern Trust has been operating for 20 years now, and currently has almost 60 venues from all over NZ. Last year we returned \$12.8m to the community. We have a Grants team here in Dunedin distributing the money, and we are very approachable for advice and information – ring us on 0800-424-274."

The Maniototo is very grateful for the work of Mearl and Jocelyn and SVCT. *"Over the years, SVCT has supported two organisations I have been heavily involved in (Art Deco Festival and the radio station). Often, costs for Event Coordinator roles or wages for a Team Leader are more difficult to find funding for. SVCT were sympathetic to those necessary pieces of keeping community events and services running. That has been very much appreciated and valued,"* says Amie Pont.

"Jocelyn and Mearl always 'got' what we were trying to achieve and supported us no end. Mearl also once said that Positively Maniototo was one of the best community publications he's ever seen. Thanks Mearl! We wish Mearl all the best in his retirement and are happy to know Jocelyn has stayed on with The Southern Trust. I'm sure the community will appreciate any support that The Southern Trust can offer."





1880'S PIPE INSULATION

Maniototo Museums

A new display is now on view in the Jubilee Museum – it is perfectly preserved straw insulation round a galvanized water pipe. Either wheat or oat straw, with few seed heads, has been used laid length wise along the pipe, about 2 to 3 cm thick, and laced together with a hand knotted light cord. The condition is amazing considering it will be at least a hundred year old,

galvanized piping was created in the 1830's, naturally the inside of the pipe is rather rusty.

The specimen has been kindly donated by Phil Flannagan who discovered it while he was doing renovations to the old Packman stables, 1865, which later, 1887, became the All Nations Store
