# **FABULOUS FARMING**

Q. Well done Tia! It's great to see you've taken your skills you've obviously learnt on the home farm and put them out for critique. What inspired you to enter the FMG Junior Young Farmer of the Year?



A. We have a young farmers club at school so I heard about it through that. I decided to give it a shot and push myself outside of my comfort zone a wee bit and put my knowledge about farming to the test.

Q. What were some of the challenges you had to undertake and what one did you find the easiest and what one the hardest?

A. We, myself and teammate Holly, had modules that had a set time where we had to answer the questions they gave us. Some of it was more practical and others Each had different sections of more theory. agricultural, health and safety, waterways and macroinvertebrate, soils and nutrients, sheep breeds with their wool and microns, Nait tags and pest control and driving a tractor we also had to prepare and present a speech (on why the primary industries should be a compulsory subject in all NZ high schools). We also had to do a farm-let where we had to assemble two troughs and a Irripod with pipes that we had to connect to a main water line, with the equipment and gear they gave us. We also had to do an exam on agriculture which was an hour long,

One of the harder challenges we had to do was probably the exam because it had such a wide range of questions to do with agriculture, horticulture and forestry - making it pretty hard to know what the right stuff to study was.

An easier challenge would've been the farm-let because it was more hands on and practical which was a wee reward in itself when we turned it on and saw that there were no leaks and that everything worked when we were under a time limit.

Q. How did you end up going in the Hawkes Bay?

A. Overall, we weren't towards the higher end of the competition but that didn't matter to us because we got the opportunity to go and experience what a young

farmer of the year final was like and got to meet new people as well as push ourselves out side of our comfort zones completely. We aim to go to finals again next year.

Q. Would you recommend to other young people to enter and how do they go about it?

A. Definitely. Young farmers have a website (www.youngfarmers.co.nz) that has all the info about their competition and the local young farmer clubs (which Maniototo has!). It's a great opportunity to have a go at and learn new skills from and more about the other sides of agriculture that there is.

Q. Has living in the Maniototo on a farm inspired what you see yourself doing in the future?

A. Living on a farm has definitely given me a passion for animals and the outdoors so I don't think I can see myself sitting in an office all the time. I would like to go overseas and see how they farm over there and experience that and then come back to the family farm to help out and maybe take over one day.

Q. You have set up a gallery in the main street of Ranfurly. How is that going and what has it done for your photography?

A. Setting up the gallery has been an amazing experience. No doubt it has been challenging at times and I truly wasn't sure I could do it but it has been one of the most positive things I have ever done. It has been a bit of a family mission and I have had loads of help from Deane, our kids, my folks and our friends. I am also very grateful for the support I get from the locals as well as visitors to our town. The gallery has allowed me

to show my new work and help people choose artwork they enjoy. It is a real boost to see my photographs all beautifully matted, mounted and framed. These finishing touches transform a photographic print into a piece of artwork and I am all the time learning new ways to present my work.

Q. You sell your work outside Ranfurly. How is that going?

A. It is an interesting experience selling my work at larger locations. Right now I regularly show my work at art shows in Christchurch and Dunedin. Buyers at these locations are pretty savvy and quiet often enjoy my more creative pieces. I have had a go at selling work at international shows with a little success but for now, I want to concentrate on the South Island, especially while we still have kids at home.

Q. Obviously the Maniototo is perfect subject matter for landscape photography but looking at some of your more traditional works, you are pushing the traditional concept of landscape. Can you tell us about your newly developing techniques?

A. Great question! When I first started out I was really trying to please everyone and show our beautiful landscape in a a way that people expected. I still definitely enjoy traditional landscape photography but I do feel good when I know that I have resisted just "checking the box" and producing images that people may have already seen. No doubt our Maniototo landscape has been instrumental in my journey as a photographer but I like to present it differently. I really enjoy capturing the Maniototo in my own style with an emphasis on shapes, textures, quirky images and getting a sense of the history of the area. The digital editing process, often in photoshop, is something i really enjoy and is a creative tool that lets me bring my ideas to life. My images are not necessarily telling an obvious story but bringing my own interpretation, particularly of the landscape and presenting it in a way that people may take another look and appreciate the beauty all around us.

Q. So, back to the award. What does it mean to you and how has this place shaped where you are today as a professional photographer?

A. I flew up to Wellington to receive this award and I had to make a short speech. I thanked the sponsors

and my awesome support crew but I also told the audience was about how I was so proud to bring this award home to Ranfurly and the Maniototo - home of stunning landscapes. So it meant a lot! I feel proud of my achievements but as a professional photographer Industry awards are important. Not just so we can say we are great photographers but to help create a benchmark that pushes everyone forward. The standard of work at these awards is very high and they encourage and reward innovation, experimentation and risk taking.

### Q. Where to from now?

A. Right now I am having a bit of a break and the gallery is on winter hours. I will be back into it in October but in the meantime I will work on more new images and some new ideas for the gallery. I am looking forward to continuing with exploring my creative photography, spending time with my family and meeting and greeting visitors to the gallery over summer. I am also looking forward to being a curling mum and supporting Zoe with her upcoming efforts overseas for curling. I feel very fortunate to have the opportunity to find a profession and a business that I enjoy that helps support my creativity and my family.



Te-Ariki Tapatu (rugby). These North versus South games are fiercely contested and our students gave their all.





such as Royal Canin Maxi Puppy Active diet contain tailored levels of energy, calcium and phosphorus to help promote optimal bone development, setting them up to be hard working adult dogs.

### **Heading Pups**

Heading dog pups are generally less susceptible to growth problems than Huntaways but still require careful, balanced feeding to prevent any problems. Heading pups can be feed a premium puppy diet until 12 months of age.

By feeding a puppy specific food that's balanced and complete, there is no need to supplement their diet with anything extra like calcium. In fact adding calcium has been proven to cause issues with growing puppies that can cause lasting damage to their bones and joints.

Puppies can be fed a premium puppy food from three to four weeks of age by soaking biscuits in hot water to soften it and feeding when it has cooled a little.

They need regular small feeds until around 3-4 months of age, then twice daily feeding until 6-7 months of age.

Feeding your working pup well, helps to develop a dog that is far more capable of working longer and more efficiently in their day to day life, as well as potentially having an extended working life.



# **CLACHANBURN COMMENT**

The mild winter continues, yes we have had a few hard frosts, but have we had enough to chill the peaonies and kill the bugs, and have we had enough moisture to fill our catchments for irrigation? Many of us can remember winters when frosts would freeze the ground in shaded areas for weeks at a time, and several snowfalls in a winter could be feet deep.

We are in changing times. It is true to say that we are a few weeks ahead of usual, here we have blossom Prunus autumnalis flowering, witch hazel, winter sweet, winter roses blooming well ahead of time, snowdrops, violets and the beginning of daphnes, and, as I write, it is still July.

So, now is the time to prune the grapevine in the glasshouse during the winter while it is still dormant and will not bleed sap. Ours would now be 60 yrs old and planted by my mother in law. It is a Black Hamburg, an old robust dessert variety which is still strong and healthy. I can remember being told when planted a dead lamb was dug in the hole, which was the custom. It was planted outside the glasshouse, and a round hole in the concrete foundation was made, and the trunk trained to grow up inside, so the roots will not be affecting the tomatoes inside. The trunk now would be 2m in height, and has two main horizontal rods, one running the length of the glasshouse and one running along the end wall. Both are supported by a wire. Over the years a new strong growing cane has been laid down, replacing the previous rod when it is not spurring well. I prune using the rod and spur system where the spurs should be developing every hand span apart. From there the laterals grow and I prune leaving two buds per lateral.

A copper and conqueror oil spray should finish the job. Follow this up with sweeping down the glasshouse and frame work, and washing with bleach, as Jeyes fluid is no longer available.

Garden pots today are not only terracotta which tended to crack in good old Central Otago frosts.

Now there are a range of fibreglass pots in different colours, and they are not affected by frosts, they are also light to handle and look good and certainly don't look flimsy. Also on the market are a variety of roughly textured pots which have been twice fired and also are not damaged by frosts. When purchasing ask questions! Buyer beware. Before repotting plants scrub the inside of pots and wash with bleach also.

Get as many jobs done now before the Spring comes.

William [Billie] Francis Wilson JACOB was the Borough Council dayman and part of his job was to fill with kerosene then light the street lamps, until power was connected 16th May 1947, a day of great celebration. A visiting photographer got Billie to pose half way up his ladder, note the cigarette while handling inflammable material. There is a replica lamp post beside the display.

Incidentally the Naseby Hospital had been generating their own power since 1924.


