#### **WATER MANIOTOTO**

Well, water we got! It's been a difficult few weeks for many and, yet again, the Maniototo community has come out in spades to support and help each other out. Good deeds included moving stranded stock, getting supplies to those stuck, evacuations, pumping out garages, moving firewood, pulling out drowned vehicles, fixing damaged roads and fences and general tidying up of a huge mess left behind.



Yet again the rugby grounds (above) turned into Lake Ranfurly but in a more spectacular fashion than a few years back. Although many were tempted, a stern warning was issued by Central Otago District Council that watersports of any kind were not to occur on the newly established tourism opportunity. Especially as, given the severity of the flooding around the town, stormwater was potentially mixing with wastewater as toilets backed up and port-a-loos were distributed.

Taieri Lake, however, on the back road from Waipiata to Kokonga was full to the brim reminding us of what it once was before it was drained in the 1940's.

Talk is this was the largest flood of the Taieri since the 90's and the worst flooding of Ranfurly township since the 80's.

According to the Water Maniototo Facebook page, "50+ mm of rain in one week hit the Upper Taieri Catchment, causing phenomenal flooding. Flood levels peaked in the Styx Vally and exceeded levels experienced in the last 25 years causing widespread damage to roads and farmland. The Loganburn creek peaked, as did water levels in the Styx. The Loganburn Dam Gate was closed with a high flow of water spilling over the spillway. But the dam is built and designed for this type of event. Strong south east winds have also bought down trees in many places."

Kokonga was badly hit and the road closed for a good week after the floods last month but it has been worse. In the December flood of 1993, SH87 was out of action for a very long time as large holes had to be filled across the flat. The state highway was tarsealed not long after that and a stop bank was built on Kokonga Road which prevented a lot of flooding.

#### **LEGACY LEFT**

A financial legacy by the late Jim Mayne was officiated at a special meeting of the Community Trust of Maniototo last month at Hawkdun Lodge. Jim worked as a Deputy Post Master and lived beside the Wallace Memorial Rooms. He was a figurehead of Ranfurly for many years, documenting many sporting events including supplying results to local community publications. His passion was such that the AJ Mayne Trust was formed to provide financial contributions to Ranfurly sporting groups (Rugby, tennis, cricket and hockey) after his passing. A total of \$9309.37 was gifted to the Community Trust of Maniototo. Friend Robin Moore represented the Trust (as a trustee), working in with Checketts McKay representative Gillian Clarke to look at a way of fulfilling Jim's wishes moving forward. "Lower interest rates meant smaller amounts set up in Trusts just don't work anymore. The money no longer served the purpose intended so Robin proposed donating it to a larger community fund with the money to be tagged for sporting purposes. The Trust document for the AJ Mayne Trust allowed this so we have pleasure in passing this legacy on." Community Trust of Maniototo Chair Dawn Sangster thanked Gillian and Robin for thinking of the Trust as the best way to use the funds. "We are looking at growing the capital of the trust and this is a great start."


Many thanks to all who helped with lunch and to Julie, Tina and Deirdre for serving it. Great job as always. Money raised goes to the swimming pool.

#### **NASEBY NIGHT SKY TOURS**

"Hi, I'm Paul and I will be your guide on a Naseby night sky tour. Originally from England, I emigrated to New Zealand in 2003, settling down in Mosgiel, near Dunedin. My interest in astronomy began with the Apollo 11 mission to the moon, when I was only 5½ years old! I still recall now, the old black and white TV in the school hall beaming out the transmission from the moon landing. My first telescope followed a few years after that and even my education turned skyward as I pursued my interest by studying astrophysics at Queen Mary College, London University.

Since obtaining my degree, my interest in astronomy has mostly been confined to studying books rather than anything practical. It wasn't until my move to New Zealand that my observational astronomy picked up again. With the wonderful southern skies, I had to get out and explore all those new objects and constellations. There's so much more going on in the southern skies - there's never a shortage of interesting objects to look at.

When I read that Naseby was seeking Dark Sky Accreditation, I decided to start a night sky tour business. The result is what you see before you now – Naseby Night Sky Tours. So, I welcome you to join me and marvel at some of the wonders of our universe. I

introduce people to some basic information about objects in our solar system before moving out into our galaxy. We cover identification of some of the more prominent constellations and basic navigation around the night sky. We look at the moon, planets, star clusters and nebulae - the birth place of stars. I try to give as much telescope time as possible and talk mainly about objects that are in the sky at the time.

Dependent upon sky access, tours are held at the Naseby Holiday Park or a dark-sky location nearby where observing equipment will already be set up. Transportation to either location can be provided (\$5 transport fee from Naseby).

The Ritchey-Chrétien telescope (or simply RC) is one of the instruments of choice due to its flat field of view, meaning that objects remain sharp right to the edge of the field of view. The RC design has been incorporated into such instruments as the Hubble Space Telescope.

Dobsonian telescopes and 25 x 100 binoculars (with tripod) are also used.

I look forward to seeing you."

If you are interested in taking a 'tour' then contact Paul on 021 234 5044. Tour dates are on any night when numbers are sufficient (more than four). Tours start a little more than an hour after sunset. Minimum age is eight years.




#### **ROLL UP FOR A NEW LOCAL HISTORY**

#### Sustainable Drench Usage

Using effective combination drenches and applying the principles of refugia are the two most potent tools we have for ensuring drenches continue to work.

Farmers who have completed a reduction test and parasite management plan testify these tools have completely changed the way they think and operate.

They claim greater control over parasite issues and that it is not just about the drench families but is equally about understanding sustainable practices.

We have a substantial list of farmers wanting to do drench reduction tests this season. Those interested in doing so should make contact with the Veterinary Centre as early as possible. Lamb weaning is a great time to start the process.

#### **Check Your Long Active Drenches**

Long acting drench products are an excellent tool in parasite management. It is essential they are used in a sustainable manner so that they remain effective for the next generation.

If capsules or LA products are used it is important to do a faecal egg count of ten treated ewes around 60 to 80 days after treatment to check the products are working correctly. This coincides conveniently with tailing time on many farms.

Our Blue Cross Territory Managers have already collected many clients' samples and our team of vets are in the process of reporting results back to farmers.

If the egg count is significant, this is a warning against future use of that specific product and may indicate the need for an exit drench of the remaining resistant worms.

So far the walls in the work room all have been stripped, ready for jib stopping and three quarters of the ceiling have completed been with three coats of ceiling paint. The brown beams are now a clean, bright white. The space looks SO much Working bigger.

Marvel at a fully operational turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century workshop where millwright and engineer Ernest Hayes invented labour-saving devices for farmers under the slogan 'durability before cheapness, first cost last cost.'

This enduring family business, E. Hayes and Sons, became famous for their perfected chain grab wire strainer design in 1924 but also turned out windmills, fence standards and gates, rabbit smokers, cattle stops, spinning jennies, wheel clamps and more.


Nine Hayes children were brought up at this site, once known as Echo farm, where a series of fascinating mud brick buildings, gardens and quirky Hayes contraptions are revealed. Ernest's wife

Hannah, initially pedalled her bike through Central Otago's desolate landscape in her long skirts to get orders for the business in 1895 – a tale that stops many of today's visitors to the Heritage New Zealand cared for property in their tracks.

A genuine example of 'Kiwi ingenuity', this historic workplace provides a rare glimpse of early technology suspended in time. Domestic life, too, is hinted at in the family's restored 1920s' homestead – a double mud brick villa with rooms filled with everyday items reflecting the era. Come and absorb the Hayes family spirit. Take a guided tour of the workshop, 'Big house' and gardens, re-wire with a Hayes roast coffee, browse the gift shop and taste some delights from Hannah's Kitchen.

To witness the web of belts and pulleys come to life inside the Hayes workshop, turn up at one of the following operating days over summer: January 6, February 3, March 3, and April 7, 2019. Tour times on the hour from 10.30am -3.30pm.



#### MANIOTOTO HEALTH SERVICES

The exciting times continue for us with the new building developing rapidly before our eyes. Every week when we tour the build there seems to have been significant advances. For the last couple of weeks it seemed that the painters were chasing the Gib fixers and stoppers down the corridors.

The exterior of the build has had shape for some time, it would seem that the last major exterior fitting will be the schist columns at the main entrance, but now we are seeing the interior taking rapid shape, not only being enclosed with windows and doors but interior walls and colours taking shape – even toilets and showers in place in some en-suites.

The horrendous rain experienced has slowed the external ground preparation but you can see the drives being shaped and close to being sealed.

The large tower adjacent to the existing Chalet is a wood chip bunker for storing our boiler fuel. The wood chip boiler is next to the bunker and will provide very cost effective fuel to heat the building and water. A diesel generator will be installed as a reserve should any difficulties be experienced. I believe the local volunteer fire brigade are keen to utilise the bunker for training at height. The other foundations you may see close by are for the workshop and garage.

We have mentioned the possibility of facilities for dentistry and local Plunket volunteers as part of the conversion of the Chalet rest home into a community facility. These remain firm objectives but at this time these possibilities are some way from being finalised but we believe they would be extremely exciting and valuable services to incorporate.

A lot of effort is going in to the continuation of x-ray facilities. Our existing equipment is not an economic proposition to transfer to the new site so we are looking to ensure the best possible option to incorporate in the new community wing in terms of capability and usability.

The funding from the CODC has been welcome and we have now used the first half of the \$2million grant as payments for the development go past \$3.5million to date.

Also published is the \$250k grant from the Lions Club organisations (*Ed – see story on page 5.*) and a great combination between industry and community with Graymont pegging a donation to their local fertiliser sales realising over \$17 000.

We get continual reminders of the frailty of our old building with the most recent reminder being rain finding its way in through the old x ray chemical fume







Meals on Wheels has been a hot topic for us with the volume putting pressure on our volunteers. We have also been obligated to ensure that meals are delivered hot. This a contractual requirement and also viewed as one of the main requirements of Meals on Wheels.


The objective is to provide a meal with appropriate nutritional value providing a third of a day's nutritional values which is most effective eaten hot. In order to achieve this the meals need to be delivered within thirty minutes. There are set temperatures which must be achieved. We are working to achieve this and we will shortly provide disposable containers which will not need to be returned. We also need the cooperation of those receiving the meals to preferably meet the delivery. If the volunteers are held up at the start of the round then this means those at the end are not getting the service they deserve.

There is always a temptation to make absolutely sure that those receiving the meal are ok but this needs to happen after the delivery round or else a phone call needs to be made.

While the peak numbers have now eased back we will continue to monitor the situation to look at increasing the number of those carrying out the service. In order to ensure that the timeframe was achievable we tested the route ourselves and were able to do so comfortably within the time. We understand that there can be some physical limitations and we are happy to work with those in this status. We are incredibly appreciative of those providing the voluntary service for us and Frances Wood for the co-ordination.

A Field Day of the Upper Taieri Water Resource Management Group and invited guests was held in Kyeburn last month. Ironically, a day to discuss water conservation was met with full to brimming dams and fast flowing, flooded rivers.

Around 40 people attended with representatives from Department of Conservation, Fish and Game, Otago Regional Council (and some councilors), Irrigators from the wider community and representatives from local irrigation companies and the New Zealand Walking Access Commission.

A tour of the Catchment included John Hores new dam, Fraser and Lynley McDonalds dam, the take on Davey Greers and the 'main' take via water race alongside the Kyeburn which has five combined users.

Focused discussions for the day centered around lessons which could be learnt from of the Kyeburn Catchment Limited consent application process and how it could be done better in the future.

The day was seen as a first step to rebuild and build on relationships between irrigators and stakeholder groups that would see a quicker and less costly consenting process in the future not only for Kyeburn but the wider catchment.

Also, what is needed as well as how other areas could model on the water share arrangement in Kyeburn that has been implemented by irrigators though the consent has not yet been granted. Fish screening (and the technology required to do so efficiently) was hot topic as it would be a consent restriction, KCL are finding this very challenging to meet.

The day was followed by a lunch and meeting at the Ancient Briton Hotel where presentations were made on water quality and the work that is being done by the Otago Regional Council and community members in our catchment. This water testing program is set up to help landowners understand the environmental effect of water that leaves their property so they can find a solution to any issues ahead of the strict environmental water quality limits that will be imposed in 2020 under Plan Change 6A.

Kelly Heckler from the Manuherikia catchment presented some facts about climate change and what effect it is likely to have in Central Otago in the future which could have major implications for access to water resources. Highlighting the need for more water storage in our catchment.

Also, Bruce Monahan from the Otago Regional Council talked about deemed permits left in the catchment initiating some discussion on how to get these renewed before the 2021 deadline.

#### INTERNATIONAL CURLING RETURNS

International curling will return to New Zealand next month with the first ever World Qualification Event.

Jointly hosted by the New Zealand Curling Association and the Australian Curling Federation, it will run at Naseby's Maniototo Curling International rink from 18<sup>th</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> January. Eight Men's and eight Women's national teams will take part. The top two in each competition will qualify for the remaining two places in their respective 2019 World Championship.

"We're delighted with the chance to host a range of teams from around the world," said NZ Curling Chairman Sam Inder. "It's the first time we've seen teams from South America here, and also a first for Denmark and Hong Kong," he continued.

"And of course it's a wonderful opportunity for our local teams to have a real shot at qualifying for the Worlds."

Eleven sides have already qualified for each of the World events. The best finishers from the regional qualifiers who have not already qualified for the World Championships will be at the WQE in Naseby – 2 nations from Pacific-Asia, 4 from Europe, 1 from the Americas and the hosts.

The NZ Men last reached a World Championship in 2012, when they finished 5<sup>th</sup>. It would be a first for the Kiwi Women if they qualify from Naseby.

The eight Women's teams to compete in the WQE are Brazil, China, Czech Republic, Estonia, Finland, Hong Kong, Norway, and hosts New Zealand.

The Men's sides are Denmark, England, Finland, Guyana, Korea, Netherlands, New Zealand (after their  $4^{\text{th}}$  placing at the Pacific-Asia Championships), and joint hosts Australia.

If your garden has been flooded and small plants flattened try to get them to stand up again, and then wash off any silt, as plants need photosynthesis to thrive. One border here will need to have more mulch applied.

Now on a brighter side (or a funnier one) I recently had a garden visitor from Auckland who was drooling over the tree paeonies, the flowers were the size of dinner plates. #### **BANK NEW SOUTH WALES**

**Naseby Museum** 

The Bank of New South Wales was formed in 1817, the Hogburn gold rush was July 1863 and within a month that bank had set up an



agency in the town. It showed great faith in the future of the area by building a permanent establishment by December 1863, opposite the Police Camp. This building being replaced by another more modern one on Leven Street by Mr W. Jacob, builder, January 1875.

Fifteen years later, a 'handsome and commodious' one of imposing design was built on the same site, however this was moved to Ranfurly in September 1923 and later became the WestPac bank. In October 2016, this bank closed thus ending over 150 years service in the Maniototo.

The Maniototo Early Settlers Museum will be opening on the 12<sup>th</sup> of December 2018 and closing 28<sup>th</sup> April 2019. Days Open are Wednesday to Sunday 10.30am – 4pm.
