Things to do, places to check out!

Maniototo Museums Sporting Heroes Exhibition - The exciting new exhibition 'Maniototo Sporting Heroes Through The Ages', caters to people of all ages. Jubilee Museum, Leven Street, Naseby. Open from Friday 9th Sept.

Ranfurly Art Deco Gallery - UK Art Deco author Colin Hines claims Ranfurly is home to "the world's best '30s museum". With its comprehensive collection of 1930s clothing, bedroom, kitchen and household items it honestly portrays a Deco lifestyle. For a cold coin donation you can enjoy this Rural Art Deco gem in the heart of the Maniototo.

Curling - The ancient Scottish sport of curling is able to be played all year round at the Maniototo Indoor Curling Rink. All ages and abilities will enjoy 'having a throw' in the historic town of Naseby.

Hayes Engineering Works - New Zealand's farming community is indebted to Ernest Hayes, a farmer who produced tools at his Otarehua property in the Maniototo. Hayes inventions can still be seen throughout New Zealand today. Visitors will see the works and homestead have been well preserved and appear very much as they did when in use.

Clyde Dam - Completed in 1993, the Clyde Power Station is the largest concrete gravity dam in the country. Stop at the viewing points as you enter the Cromwell Gorge, and see for yourself this amazing example of modern engineering.

Bannockburn - To the south of Cromwell is Bannockburn. Places to visit include the Bannockburn Sluicings, local wineries and Bannockburn Inlet. Walking or mountain-biking is a great way to see these areas. Over the hill from Bannockburn is the Nevis Valley - a remote back country valley offering dramatic landscapes and gold mining relics.

Old Cromwell Town - Old Cromwell Town is home to local craftspeople and a cafe. Enjoy a stroll around this historic precinct located at the end of Melmore Terrace. A great place to find that special memento of your holiday. Open every day, entry is free.

Lake Dunstan - Cromwell's Lake Dunstan offers a variety of activities. A selection of walking tracks, ample picnic areas and facilities allow visitors to enjoy the lake all year round.

Vineyards - On your journey through Central Otago you will find many wonderful wineries to visit, where you can taste some of the finest wines Central Otago and New Zealand have to offer!
